

The members, who can lose sight of this truth, must work to preserve this unity. Paul is not referring to doctrinal disputes but human concerns when he requests unity. He does so not do so in his own name: "I appeal to you brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree and that there be no dissensions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same judgment."

There are so many reasons to be divided, which Paul admits. He also admits that Christ does not play favorites: "Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to the Gentiles." How can we overcome these divisions? He says: "But to those who are called both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God." Being called is vital. Are we among the called? How do we know? These are called: "God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise, God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong, God chose what is low and despised in the world, even things that are not, to bring to nothing things that are, so that no human being might boast in the presence of God."

If we have the privilege of Catholicism, authentic traditional Roman Catholicism, we have been called to it by Christ, not because we were worthy, but because we were needy: foolish, weak, and low. Boasting in the Lord, only, is the mark of a faithful member of the Church.

Pastor's Corner



Dear Parishioners,

We have discussed what it means to be Catholic, and *Roman* Catholic. Now we turn to the question of what it means to be a *traditional* Roman Catholic. Do we call ourselves that? If we do, we better be clear what is meant. The truth is like a tight-rope; we can easily fall if we're not careful.

By traditional Catholic, do we mean a smaller category of Catholic, as in Asian-American vs. American? If so, we are limiting our faith, which is not good. Do we mean a larger category, as in, outer space, vs. space. This is not impossible because the faith is already all-embracing. Do we mean to indicate a style, as in, formal reception vs. reception? Possible, but then it is reduced to a mere personal preference, which is of little consequence. Do we mean to indicate a specialty, like calling someone a jazz musician vs. a musician. Again, this reduces to a personal thing and of little consequence. Do we mean it as a rejection of something else? For instance, calling oneself a capitalist could just mean a hatred of Communism. Being traditional could mean just a rejection of Modernism, or something else. This is fine, as far as it goes, but inadequate. Rejecting heresy and Satan himself is necessary, but it is inadequate by itself.

Finally, do we mean to indicate an authenticity, like saying genuine leather vs. leather? These phrases mean exactly the same thing so 'genuine' might seem superfluous. And yet we use phrases like this often. There are two obvious reasons: saying 'genuine leather' is a way of underscoring the authenticity, but also excluding the possibility of a leather substitute. I like this option the best. The word traditional is really superfluous: to be Catholic is to be traditional already, and to be a traditional Catholic is really nothing other than to be Catholic. But it remains a useful phrase.

Where's the tight-rope? We can easily displease God by fostering divisions. Caution! St. Paul indicates to us (through 1Cor 1:10-31) that the Church is, of its nature, one body because we have one redeemer. He says: *"Each one of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollo," or "I belong to Cephas," ... Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? The Church should appear united because it is united.*

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HISTORY

In 1980, the Health Wagon was founded by Sr. Bernie Kenny with the order of Medical Missionaries of Mary. She came to the Appalachian mountains at the request of the Richmond Catholic Diocese. She started the program when she began dispensing health care and a kind touch from her Volkswagen Beetle. St. Mary's Hospital provided a valuable partnership and sponsored the program for over twenty-five years. Sr. Bernie turned over the reins of the organization in December 2005 to Teresa Gardner who has been with The Health Wagon for over eighteen years.

The Health Wagon continues to strive to meet the unique challenges of health care delivery to the medically underserved and indigent in poverty-stricken areas of rural Appalachia. Through the use of this innovative mobile health unit, health care doors are opened to many needy individuals, families and communities; doors that would have otherwise remained closed.

The Health Wagon visits eleven sites in Southwest Virginia's Buchanan, Dickenson, Lee, Russell, Scott, and Wise counties on a weekly, biweekly, and monthly basis. Accessibility to culturally sensitive primary health care services that emphasize education and prevention is considered the key to improving the health status for populations residing in these rural areas. Services are rendered essentially free of charge; however, donations are encouraged and accepted.



HEALTH WAGON FACTS:

The Health Wagon is a nonprofit organization providing mobile health services to the medically underserved in Southwest Virginia since 1980.

The Health Wagon visits eleven sites in Virginia's Buchanan, Dickenson, Russell, Lee, Scott, and Wise counties (and the City of Norton) to serve a severely medically underserved population.

The Health Wagon's staff consists of two full time certified family nurse practitioners, one registered nurse, two licensed practical nurses, a Director of Operations, a Director of Development, Data Systems Coordinator, and an Administrative Assistant.

Every dollar donated to the Health Wagon is approximately \$100 reaped in health care benefits.

In 2013, the Health Wagon assisted more than 11,000 patients obtain access to care valued at over \$1 million.

Health Wagon Collection 2015

As you may recall, last summer, I along with Msgr. Mark Lane, Justin Reilly, then director of the Diocese's Office of Social Ministries, traveled to the Wise County Fairgrounds to observe and bless the annual Remote Area Medical (RAM) event, a three-day health clinic where thousands of residents received free medical, vision, and dental care. We were profoundly moved by the suffering and need of the many people who showed up before dawn to receive care at the RAM event. We were blessed to witness the generosity and compassion of the medical professionals and event volunteers who spent many hours treating those who needed medical care.

The Health Wagon traces its roots to the Catholic Church and Medical Missionaries of Mary Sister Bernie Kenny, who founded the clinic on wheels in 1980.

Three-and-a-half decades later the Health Wagon continues offering free health care to people in six counties and one city in Southwest Virginia. They serve a population with a [poverty rate of 70% to 140% higher](#) than the rest of Virginia. The Health Wagon provides healthcare based on Catholic principles,

Because providing care to the poor is part of our shared mission - and these people live within the bounds of our Diocese - and because I am impressed by the history and work of the Health Wagon, I ask all parishes within the Diocese to conduct this second collection for the next three years.
