Pastor's Corner Cont'd.

Catholic Fine Art. What is your experience of modern fine art in the Church?

Do you feel edified when you hear modern music, see modern sculpture, or spend time in a modern church? Is there clarity or rather confusion? Do you feel like you understand, or is it unintelligible? Does it lift you up to a timeless truth or drown you in the mere human? A case in point: the Cathedral of the Risen Christ in Lincoln, Nebraska had a modern statue of its namesake in the sanctuary. The image was so unintelligible that children were afraid of it. The succeeding bishop, **Bruskewitz**, had it removed and parked in the vestibule. Listen to what his successor, Bishop Conley, said about Bruskewitz: *"The '80s and '90s were a time of confusion, perhaps even among the bishops it wasn't always clear where we were headed ... Bruskewitz was always a bellwether that you could rely on."*** Now, is there any doubt that the one who was most clear on faith and morals, was also clear about fine art?

Art, therefore, is not a side issue. It reminds us of what we love, or teaches us to love the wrong things. Our art must follow our faith and charity. Consider **Mary Magdalene** who anointed our Lord with very expensive spikenard, whose fragrance filled the whole house. The beauty of the fragrance might be taken as a symbol for all fine art. There were two objections for what she did: it was called a waste of money by Judas Iscariot, and Simon the Pharisee objected to her touching our Lord. Our Lord defended her: her act was an act of love, more than the Pharisees' love, and it was not a waste! The poor you have always with you. Our Lord was teaching us to use beauty, and the expense it necessitates, in our worship of Him, as an act of faith and love! What can represent love better than something beautiful? This is the Church's attitude.

Figuring out how to make our art follow our faith and charity is the work we are currently doing. Thank you for your support.

Dear Parishioners,
Its great: we've had 106 responses on the "Building Use Survey." For those who are not on the parish e-mailing list, you did not get the link to complete the survey.* If you don't use the internet, I will have some hard copies of the survey on the back table today. Please complete and return them by next Sunday, June 21st. The deadline for the online survey is pushed to June 21st also. Thank you for participating.

The Master Plan. As you know, we are engaged in the process of developing an overall plan for the property. It is a slow process; we are trying to avoid precipitous decisions. One reason a master plan is difficult is because it puts together a knowledge of the past and present to take care of a future with many unknowns. The Building Use Survey was about the present. The past is actually where Catholicism excels. Being as we are, apostolic, we enjoy a very secure foundation of authority, doctrine, morality and liturgy. Also included on the list is fine art. The arts of music, poetry, literature, painting, sculpture and architecture are tangible signs of our mostly invisible faith.

Faith is free, but fine art costs money. Someone has already expressed anxiety over debt. It's an important topic, for sure. One of the benefits of being a diocesan parish is that we are subject to a bishop. This one happens to be an excellent administrator. His policies are based on a wealth of experience. The diocese will not allow any project to happen without wise financial controls in place. If any parish is to incur any debt, it will be in a moderate fashion, and under strict guidelines. Therefore, please rest easy.

A second anxiety some may feel is that process is secretive. What's happening, merely without fanfare, is dreary, painstaking homework. Decisions will be based on our homework. No major decisions, however, will be taken without the consultation of you the parishioners. It is intended that there will be no surprises. Because we want to accomplish something, as you know, the process cannot be democratic.
