Pastor's Corner



Dear Parishioners,

One of the caricatures made as an objection to the Latin Mass is that the Priest is up there, his back to the people, speaking a dead language no one understands. No one really knows what he is saying, there is no "active participation" and most people attending have to "suffer" through Mass until they can receive what they came for — Holy Communion...

Of course, we know that the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass (as we are blessed to have it) is precisely that: The greatest and Most Holy Sacrifice. This form of the Sacrifice has made great saints throughout the centuries. It contains a structure and texts used since time immemorial. We participate in this Sacrifice actively and to the greatest extent when, with Our Lady at the foot of the Cross, we unite our hearts to Jesus. This is sealed when we receive Him: Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity.

The questions we should ask ourselves are: Do I make the most of this Holy Sacrifice? Do I prepare for this Holy Sacrifice? Do I follow along as this Mystery is unveiled? Or do I just "suffer" through Mass?

There may be times when you can enter St. Joseph's, close your eyes and get into the zone. You can unite yourself to the Sacrifice in a contemplative way and reap abundant fruits from your union. There will be times when you are distracted or the circumstances may be distracting. To alleviate this, you should always carry with you a most important tool: the hand Missal. Some days, you may need it as far as the words of the Introit and Our Lord will use those words or some others to sweep you off into contemplation. Other days, you will need to follow word for word to ward off distractions and unite yourself to the Sacrifice at the Altar. St Teresa of Avila always took a book with her to mental prayer. Sometimes she would not need it.

The Missal is one of the greatest and most neglected tools in Traditional parishes. It ought to be a guide to worship God in the Most Holy Sacrifice, to keep us from aimless distractions and to facilitate our union with inflamed hearts.

The Month of the Holy Souls

On all the days from November 1 through November 8 inclusive, a plenary indulgence, applicable only to the Poor Souls, is granted (under the usual conditions*) to those who visit a cemetery and pray, even if only mentally, for the departed. Partial indulgences are granted to those who recite Lauds or Vespers of the Office of the Dead, and to those who recite the prayer “*Requiem aeternam dona eis, Domine, et lux perpetua luceat eis. Requiescant in pace*” (“Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace”).

Nov. 2—All Souls Day

On this feast, priests may say three Masses. Fr. Franco will say Low Masses at 7 am, 7:30 am, and 8 am (times approximate). All are welcome to attend any or all of these Masses, but are reminded that the faithful are only permitted to receive the Blessed Sacrament twice in one day.

Fr. Marsolle will say a High Mass at 10 am for the repose of the soul of our founding pastor, Fr. Adrian Harmening, O.S.B. Fr. Marsolle will also say Low Masses at 12:30 pm and 6 pm.

Also on this feast, a plenary indulgence, applicable only to the Poor Souls, is granted (under the usual conditions) to those who visit any parish church or public oratory and there recite one Our Father and one Credo.

On Indulgences

- A. Indulgences, which remove temporal punishment due to forgiven sin, may be gained by the living for themselves or applied to the souls in purgatory but they cannot be applied to other living persons.
- B. Indulgences are called plenary if they remove all temporal punishment and partial if they remove only some of it.
- C. A plenary indulgence can be acquired only once in the course of a day but a partial indulgence may be acquired more than once a day.
- D. To gain an indulgence for oneself one must be baptized, in the state of grace at least at the completion of the prescribed work and subject to the one granting the indulgence. He must also have at least a general intention of gaining them and must perform the works enjoined at the time and in the manner prescribed.
- E. “To acquire a plenary indulgence,” the 1999 *Enchiridion of Indulgences*, issued by the Sacred Penitentiary, states, “it is necessary to perform the work to which the indulgence is attached and to fulfill the following three conditions: sacramental confession, eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intention of the Sovereign Pontiff. It is further required that all attachment to sin, even venial sin, be absent.
“If the latter disposition is in any way less than perfect or if the prescribed three conditions are not fulfilled, the indulgence will be partial only...”
- F. The three conditions may be fulfilled several days before or after the performance of the prescribed work; it is, however, fitting that Communion be received and the prayer for the intention of the Sovereign Pontiff be said on the same day the work is performed. The condition of sacramental confession may be fulfilled within a period of about twenty days before or after the work is performed.
