of the amount of requests. I cannot do otherwise. This is why I had previously asked anyone desirous of an appointment to get their ducks in a row. If they do, I can usually quickly ascertain whether what they need is within my realm of expertise.

Here is a basic summary of the contrary: "Father, my life is a mess. Let me dump it all on your desk. Fix it for me."

In this example, I would ask first if they had done their homework. Did they actually prepare and think about it or are they figuring out life as they are speaking? Most importantly, did they pray about it, present it to God, spend due time with God before the tabernacle? Did they come up with pros and cons, especially if it is a dire situation and they have a choice to make? Do they have a plan to run by me? If yes, the appointment will be fruitful and I will be grateful for time well-spent.

The best thing I can do is guide someone to adopt and practice a non-negotiable spiritual life; a life of intimacy with Our Lord. A priest should not foster dependency on himself but dependency on Our Lord.

There are many times when I receive an "emergency request" that is not a sacramental emergency. When I get back to them within a couple days, I can't tell you how often I am told: "Well, Father, I actually thought it through and prayed about it... and the answer is clear."

Please know that you and your families are in my prayers, especially at the Altar of Our Lord.

Pastor's Corner



Dear Parishioners,

I know it's dry to start off with a definition, but here we go anyway. **Triage:** a process of sorting and prioritizing projects to best achieve a desired outcome.

This is, of course, a non-medical definition. I couldn't imagine when I was in formation how crucially important and necessary a discipline it would be. I have touched upon triage in previous pastor's corners. Many of you were surprised and told me it was helpful, as you didn't know what goes into a parish priest's day.

Triage is a principle I have to apply daily, out of necessity and all across the board (emails, appointments, sacraments, building maintenance and projects, etc.) It's mathematical. I will give you an example: Let's say 5% of our parishioners have a request to run by me. That would make at least 50 requests. Among these 50 requests, some would be necessary and legitimate, some would be nice and considerate, and others would be neither. The requests would probably cover the spectrum from the sublime to the ridiculous, and most authors of the requests would probably consider their idea the best in the world and its urgency paramount. I must prioritize these requests, and despite my efforts some legitimate requests slip through the cracks as my days are full of surprises.

The more I interact and discuss ministry with various priests around the globe, the more I see how there is a general confusion among the faithful as to what a priest's role actually is. A priest is not a life-coach, a priest is not a shrink, and a priest is not a counselor (unless he is qualified as such, and if he practiced, he could not be a parish priest because he would not have the time). A priest is, of course, one who offers Sacrifice. A priest is able to dispense the Sacraments. A priest hopefully knows the principles of our Faith and is able to assist in the moral and spiritual realms. A priest is hopefully a man of prayer and a man of discernment, but he is still only human. He has human limitations and is subject to a 24 hour day too.

Unfortunately in our day and age, we are trained to get answers with the touch of a button, and with our fallen human nature, we always want the most effortless answer. As you may know, my appointment calendar usually gets booked far in advance. Why? Because
