Pastor's Corner



Dear Parishioners,

Back in December, I was asked to be Subdeacon for a Pontifical Mass at the Throne at the Carmel of Jesus, Mary and Joseph in Fairfield, PA. The occasion was the Solemn Profession of Vows and Veiling of Sister Genevieve of St. Therese, OCD, a former parishioner of St. Joseph's!

The Local Ordinary, His Excellency Bishop Gainer, celebrated the Pontifical Traditional Mass and presided over the veiling ceremony. He has given the black veil to most of the professed nuns in the monastery and there are quite a few! Although I have never served a Pontifical in such a small space, it was especially beautiful. The current chapel is in a barn which will become a workshop once the Carmelites have their proper chapel fully built.

The veiling ceremony took place at the end of Mass; here are some of the details that struck me most. Forgive my memory if they are not in order! The Solemn Vows are a sister's promise to Our Lord. It is her wedding ceremony to Him. When a Carmelite makes her solemn vows, she receives a black veil (instead of the white veil worn as a novice). She sings a hymn to Our Lord imploring Him to receive her in His Mercy (Sr. Genevieve did so beautifully!) The Bishop blesses the veil, the sister kneels before the Bishop and kisses a Crucifix, and the Bishop places the veil over the sister's head. She then prostrates in choir with her arms extended as on a cross. The Te Deum is sung, while rose petals are sprinkled upon her. The remainder of the day, as befits a newlywed bride, she wears a crown of flowers on top of her new black veil and carries a beautiful crucifix.

After the ceremony, the Deacon and I were granted a rare privilege: we accompanied the Bishop inside the cloister (without permission, I think this is an excommunicable offense!) They had a simple carriage ready for him which was pulled by one of the horses they use for labor. We toured the property. The progress they have made in their buildings is stunning. We were then invited to their chapter room and, following a short visit, the sisters (they are numerous!) had prepared a talent show for His Excellency. There is a lot of talent
